SYNOPSIS

It gives me great pleasure to report that **crime in Tredyffrin Township decreased a total of 15% during calendar year 2002**. As you may know, crime is classified, counted, and reported in two distinctly different categories. These categories are known by statisticians and researchers as Part I crime and Part II crime, respectively. Part I crimes consist of those crimes that one may consider to be the most serious crime affecting society and is comprise of a very specific sub-set of crimes that are routinely reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for comparison with other municipalities of similar size and demographics. Part II crimes, on the other hand, are defined as any crime other than Part I crime and are generally considered to be less serious crimes, even nuisance crimes, tending to impact the quality of life only of those specifically affected by this secondary level of crime.

I am pleased to report that **Part I crimes decreased 8%** during calendar year 2002 from 500 such crimes reported during 2001 to 461 such crimes during 2002. The import of this statistic is quite significant to our many and varied constituencies. For instance, any fear associated with crime may be reduced in the minds of Tredyffrin Township citizens and business owners in the knowledge that serious crime in the Township has actually and literally been reduced by 8% during the last calendar year. This is also an important statistic for those individuals considering moving their families and/or businesses into Tredyffrin Township as it is a statistic that can be compared nationwide against other municipalities of similar size and demographics and a statistic that is easily accessible by those seeking such information in their decision-making process.

Down are the crimes of burglary, theft , theft of motor vehicle, and arson. Up are the crimes of murder, rape, and assault. Remaining constant is the crime of robbery. Of significant note during 2002 is that Tredyffrin Township experienced the first murder in the Township in the past 20 years. That incident was discovered November 19, 2002, and has been diligently pursued by the police department since that time. Although no one has yet been formally charged with that crime, the Tredyffrin Township Police Department has identified a suspect, placed him in jail on unrelated charges, and is awaiting results of forensic analysis of evidence found at the scene of the crime.

I am also pleased to report that **Part II crimes decreased 18%** during calendar year 2002 from 1251 such crimes reported during 2001 to 1030 such crimes during 2002. Although this figure is not reported to the Federal Bureau of Investigation for comparison purposes, it is a statistic that affects the overall quality of life of those of us living and/or working in Tredyffrin Township. This 18% decrease in reported Part II crimes can very realistically be viewed another way. For instance, we can say that there were 221 fewer victims of nuisance crime during 2002 with a commensurate 18% increase in the overall quality of life of our residents and business owners.

I am also pleased to report that there was a **12% decrease in the overall economic impact of crime** in Tredyffrin Township during 2002. During the past calendar year, victims of crime in the Tredyffrin Township lost \$88,000 fewer dollars due to crime this past year than as compared to the economic loss incurred during 2001. The economic loss associated with crime during 2002 for the crimes of theft and motor vehicle theft decreased 15% and 68 %, respectively. However, the economic loss associated with burglary and robbery increased 120% and 2532%, respectively.

Although the actual number of burglaries in Tredyffrin Township decreased by two, the total value of the property stolen during 2002 increased significantly. This can be attributed most specifically to the high cost of electronic products, such as laptop computers, which tend to be targeted regularly in commercial burglaries as readily disposable items. The dramatic increase in the economic loss associated with the crime of robbery is directly attributable to two bank robberies that occurred in Tredyffrin Township during 2002, one of which has already been solved with the bank robber already in jail. If not for these two bank robberies, the economic loss associated with crime would have remained relatively consistent with the previous year.

Traffic accidents in Tredyffrin Township increased overall by 6% during 2002 with the sub-categories of reportable accidents and non-reportable accidents increasing 7% and 6%, respectively. Conversely, fatal traffic accidents decreased by 75% and deer related traffic accidents decreased by 10%. Although deer related traffic crashes decreased by 10% during 2002, this should not be seen as either a victory or as a turning point with respect to accidents involving deer. The actual number of accidents involving deer during 2002 is as high today as it was in 1996 when the Board of Supervisors first decided to authorize hunting by a professional archery association. Without this courageous step taken by the Tredyffrin Township Board of Supervisors it is clear that accidents involving deer today would be far greater than currently realized. The Board of Supervisors is encouraged to explore new and innovative ways to continue to cull the deer herd and, thereby, reduce the potential for personal injury or property damage associated with deer in the Township.

Lastly, I would like to acknowledge the Board of Supervisors' approval of the police department's plan to reorganize during the 2002 calendar year. The police department created a Captain's position and promoted Lieutenant Andy Chambers to that position during early 2002. Captain Chambers' promotion, in addition to retirements at the end of 2001 and throughout 2002, created openings at the lieutenant, sergeant, and entry levels of the organization. The police department spent the entire year filling attrition at the entry level and training newly promoted sergeants and lieutenants in their new levels of authority and responsibility. As far as personnel assignments are concerned, the police department minimized the number of officers conducting administrative tasks during 2002 and maximized the number of officers assigned to the Patrol function to 82% of the organization. I am proud to say that the reorganization of the police department can be directly attributable to the success realized by the agency during 2002.

It is with great pride and pleasure that I present this synopsis of the Tredyffrin Township Police Department's Annual Report for the calendar year 2002. It is my sincere desire that this synopsis is both informative to you and useful to the various constituencies we are sworn to protect and serve.

GENERAL STATISTICS

2002

The General Statistics for the Tredyffrin Township Police Department during 2002 reveal a 5% reduction in the number of calls-for-service for the past year and an 11% reduction since 2000. 2002 general statistics also reveal that crime reported to the Tredyffrin Township Police Department decreased 15% overall, with an 8% reduction in serious crime and an 18% reduction in secondary crime. The reduction in calls-for-service, coupled with a significant decrease in crime point toward a very positive outlook for the community with respect to providing a safe environment in which to raise a family or locate a business.

The Police Department is extremely proud of this most significant improvement in public safety in our community. Our elected and appointed leaders in Tredyffrin Township are invited to share in this realized goal of a safer community.

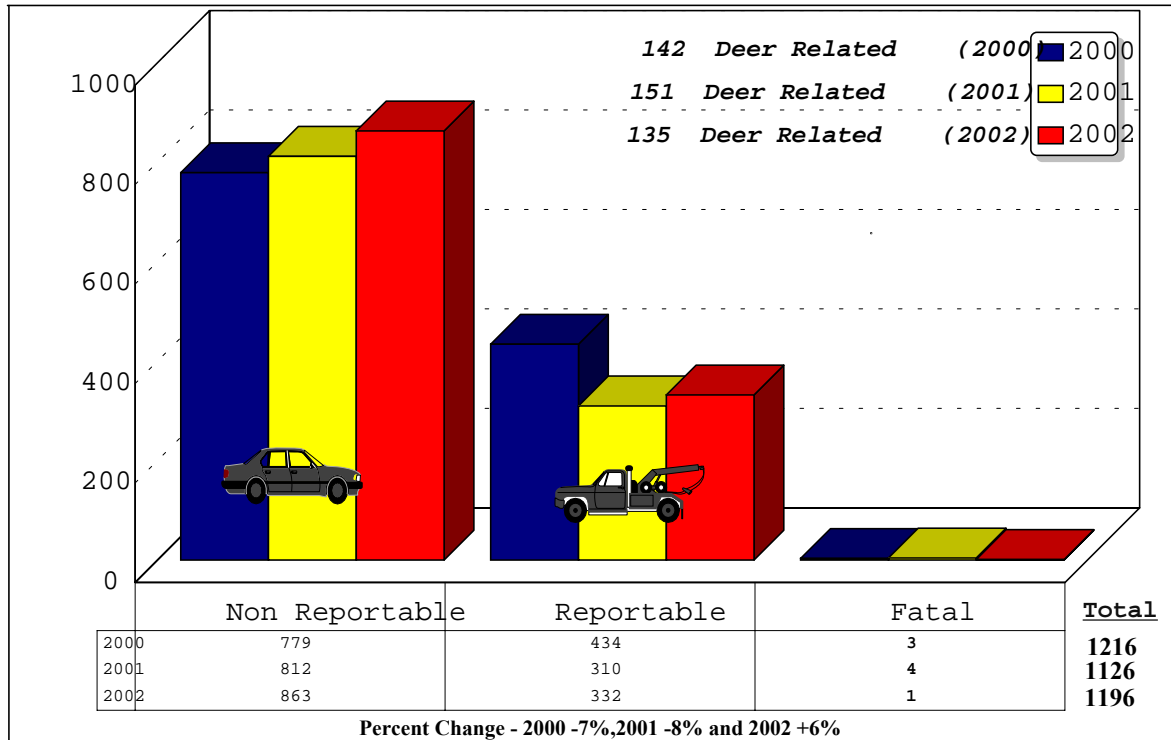

Accident Analysis - 2002



ACCIDENT ANALYSIS

Overall, vehicle crashes in Tredyffrin Township increased 6% from 2001 to 2002, with a total of 70 more accidents occurring during 2002. However, the raw numbers do not depict an accurate account of the entire picture. Vehicle accidents, more particularly described as “vehicle crashes” as most accidents are not quite as “accidental” as one might suspect, should be divided into three categories: 1. Reportable Crashes; 2. Non-Reportable Crashes; and 3. Fatalities. Here in Tredyffrin Township, it is also important to add a fourth category: Deer Related Crashes. Please refer to the section, “**DEER RELATED INCIDENTS,**” for a statistical analysis of deer crashes.

REPORTABLE CRASHES:

Reportable crashes are defined as those crashes in which the driver, vehicle occupant, pedestrian, or bicyclist is injured, or the damage to any vehicle is so severe as to render the vehicle inoperable. During the calendar year 2002, reportable crashes increased 7% from 310 during 2001 to 332 during 2002.

NON-REPORTABLE CRASHES:

Non-reportable crashes are defined as the converse of reportable crashes. Stated another way, non-reportable crashes are those crashes where no one was injured and the vehicle was able to be removed from the crash scene under its own power. Although Commonwealth law does not require one to report these crashes to the police, some individuals and, more particularly, their insurance companies, request a police investigation nonetheless. As such, the police department can count those non-reportable crashes that are actually reported to the police, but there is no way to know what percent of these type crashes are reported or actually occur in the Township.

Those non-reportable crashes reported to the police department increased by 6% from 812 during 2001 to 863 during 2002.

FATALITIES:

Fatal crashes increased by 75% during 2002 from 4 during 2001 to 1 during the calendar year 2002.

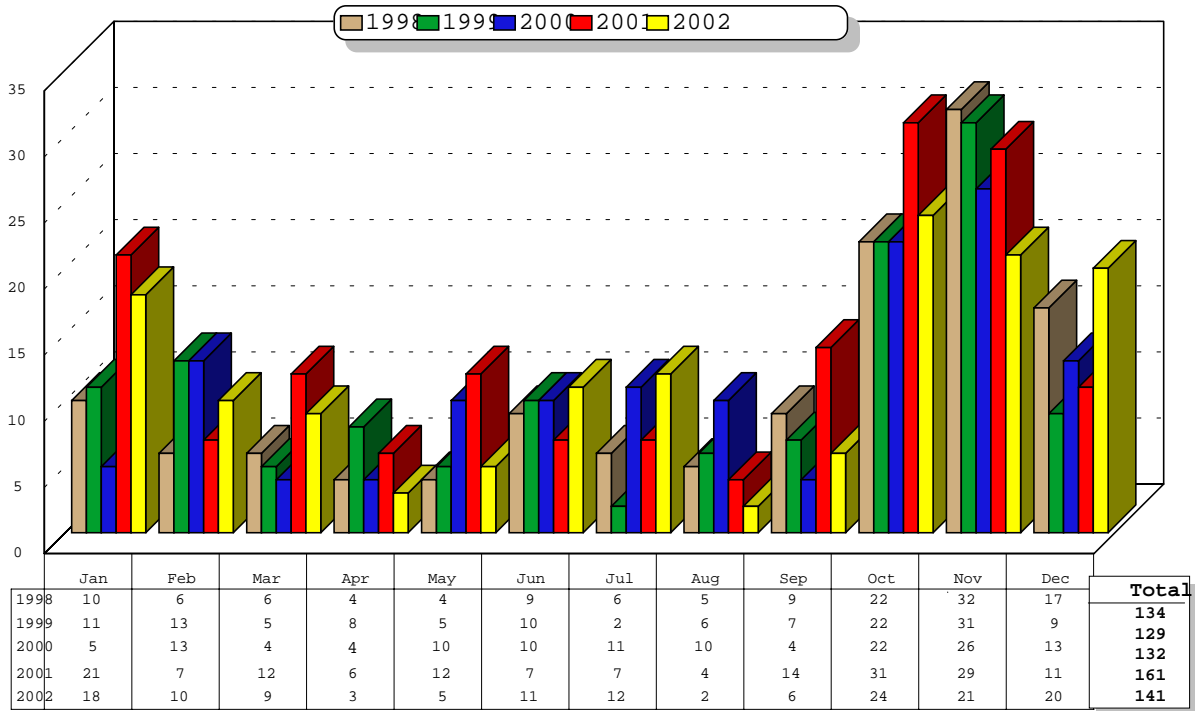
DEER RELATED CRASHES:

Deer related incidents defined as all incidents involving deer, decreased 10% between 2001 and 2002. In raw figures, that equates to a decrease of 16 incidents, from 151 during 2001 to 135 during 2002. By far, the vast majority of deer related incidents involved deer crashes – 96% or 135 deer crashes out of a total of 141 deer related incident sin the Township.

DEER RELATED INCIDENTS

Deer related incidents, defined as all incidents involving deer, decreased 12% between 2001 and 2002. In raw figures, that equates to a decrease of 20 incidents from 161 during 2001 to 141 during 2002. By far, the vast majority of deer related incidents involved vehicle crashes -- 96% or 135 crashes out of a total of 141 deer related incidents.

Viewed in dollars and cents, if one considers \$1,000 to be the average cost to repair a vehicle after a deer crash, and I suggest that \$1,000 is a low but very real estimate, then residents and visitors of Tredyffrin township suffered over \$135,000 in property loss due to deer crashes during the calendar year 2002. During the past three years, residents and visitors of Tredyffrin Township suffered a loss of almost \$430,000 due to deer crashes and a loss of approximately \$1.4 million over the past ten years.

Although deer related traffic crashes decreased 10% during 2002, this should not be seen as either a victory or a turning point with respect to vehicle crashes involving deer. The actual number of accidents during 2002 was as high as in 1996 when the Board of Supervisors first decided to authorize hunting in Township parks by a professional archery association. Without this courageous step taken by the Board of Supervisors it is clear that accidents involving deer today would be far greater than current levels. Therefore, it is suggested that any and all efforts to kill the deer herd in Tredyffrin Township be continued and further encouraged to lessen the property loss and/or cost associated with deer crashes.

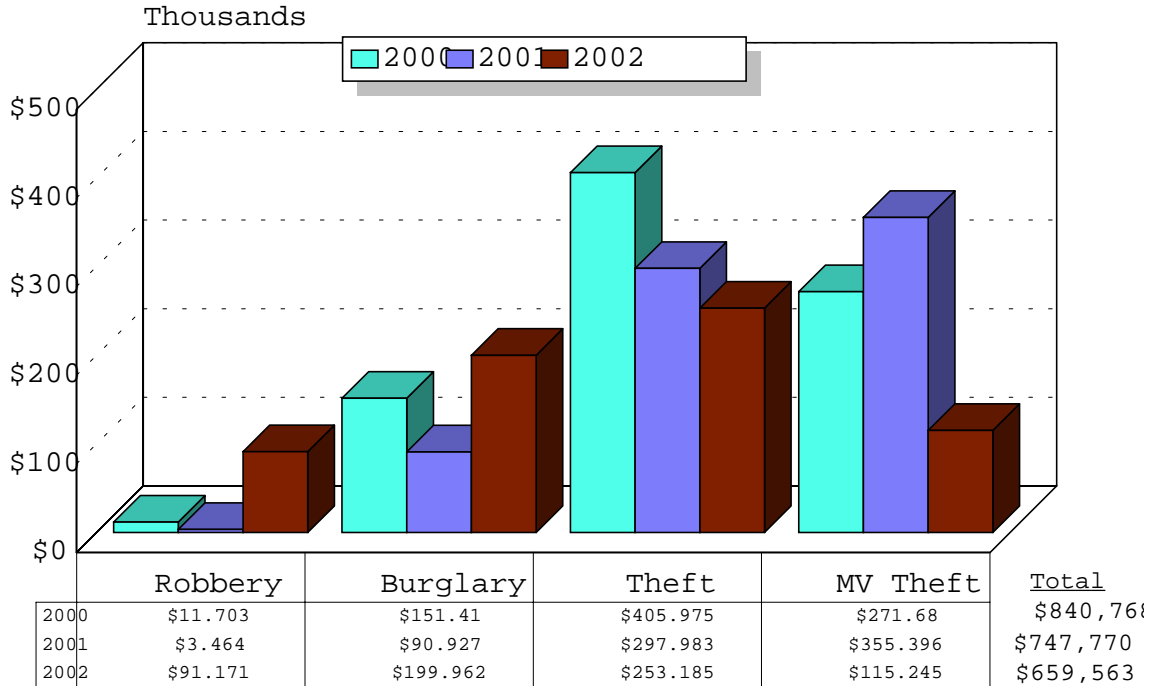

PROPERTY LOSS

Crime related property loss to residents and visitors of Tredyffrin Township decreased 13% during the calendar year 2002 from \$747,770 to \$659,563 a reduction of \$88,207. During the three year period from 2000 to 2002, residents and visitors of Tredyffrin Township realized an overall 11% reduction in crime related property loss. Over a five year period from 1998 to 2002, crime related property loss has been reduced by 53%. The following is an itemized list of property loss during 2001 for specific crimes:

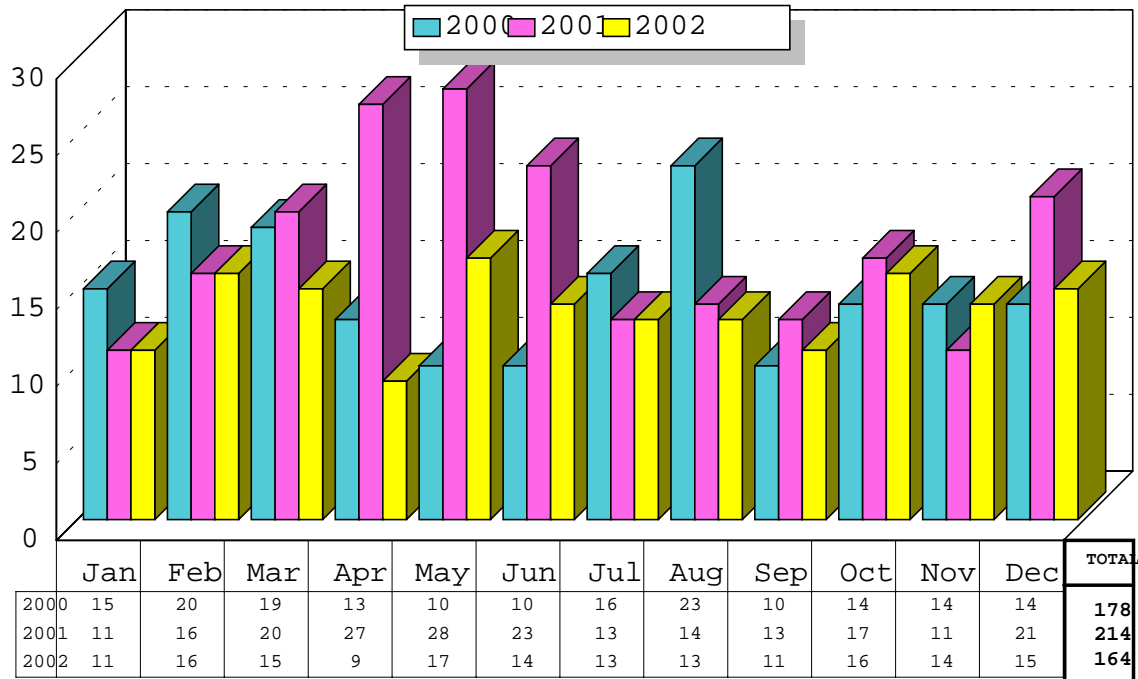

DRIVING UNDER THE INFLUENCE

The Tredyffrin Township Police Department places high emphasis on searching for DUI drivers in an attempt to lower fatalities in the township due to alcohol and/or drug related vehicle crashes and to lessen the overall personal injury and property loss due to vehicle crashes. During the calendar year 2001, the police department arrested 214 individuals for Driving Under the Influence of Alcohol or Drugs. That was the highest of any Chester County law enforcement agency and an achievement of which the police department won an award during 2001 from the Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD) organization.

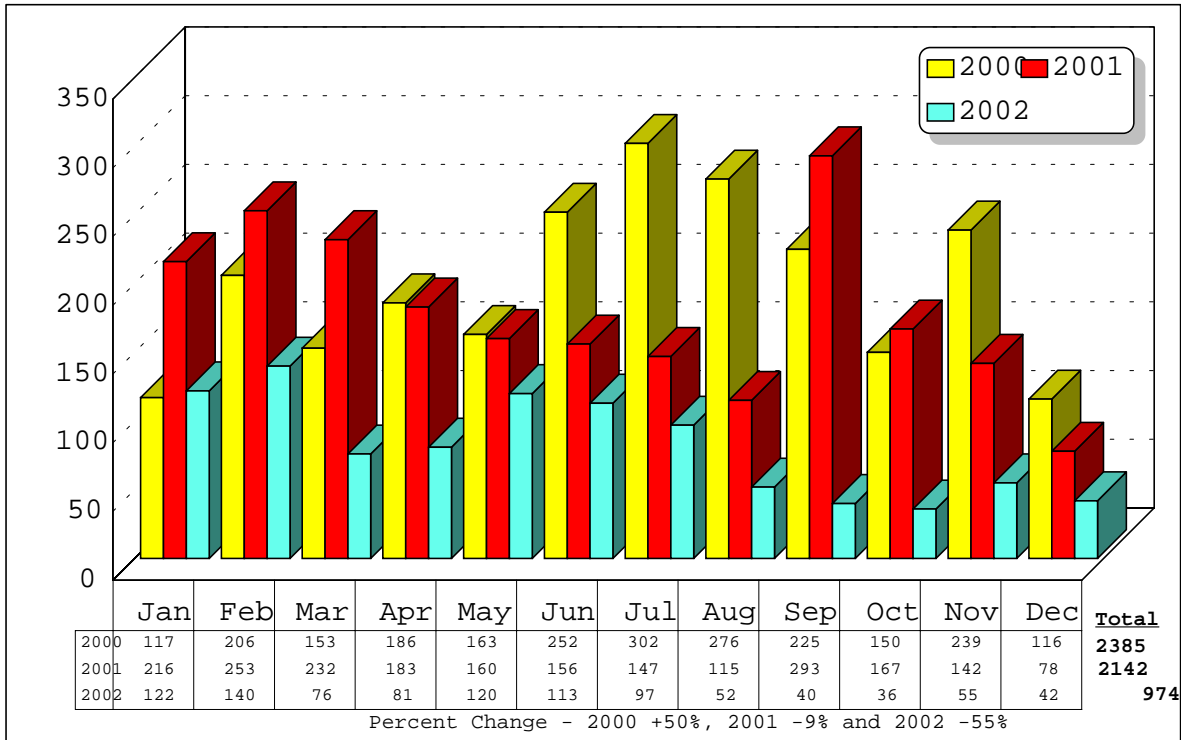
During the calendar year 2002, Tredyffrin Township Police Department realized a 23% decrease in DUI arrests by handling 164 such incidents. Although statistics are not yet available from other Chester County law enforcement agencies, I suggest that our figures in this category are again the highest in Chester County.

TRAFFIC SAFETY UNIT STATISTICS

Traffic arrests and written warnings issued by the Traffic Safety Unit fell 55% during calendar year 2002. The decrease during 2002 may be attributed to additional responsibilities placed on the Unit by the Superintendent and sporadic reassignment of Traffic Safety Unit personnel to the Patrol function to fill as many as eight vacancies that existed in the patrol force during 2002. All in all, the Traffic Squad provides a valuable service to the residents and visitors of Tredyffrin Township and should be viewed as the “go-to” unit when special projects need to be accomplished.

Now that Tredyffrin Township Police Department is staffed at its full authorized strength, the Traffic Safety Unit has been reconfigured during early 2003 with additional personnel assigned and an emphasis placed on the unit’s goals and objectives. Specific emphasis has been placed on the productivity of the Traffic Safety Unit during 2003 with high expectations for specific results.

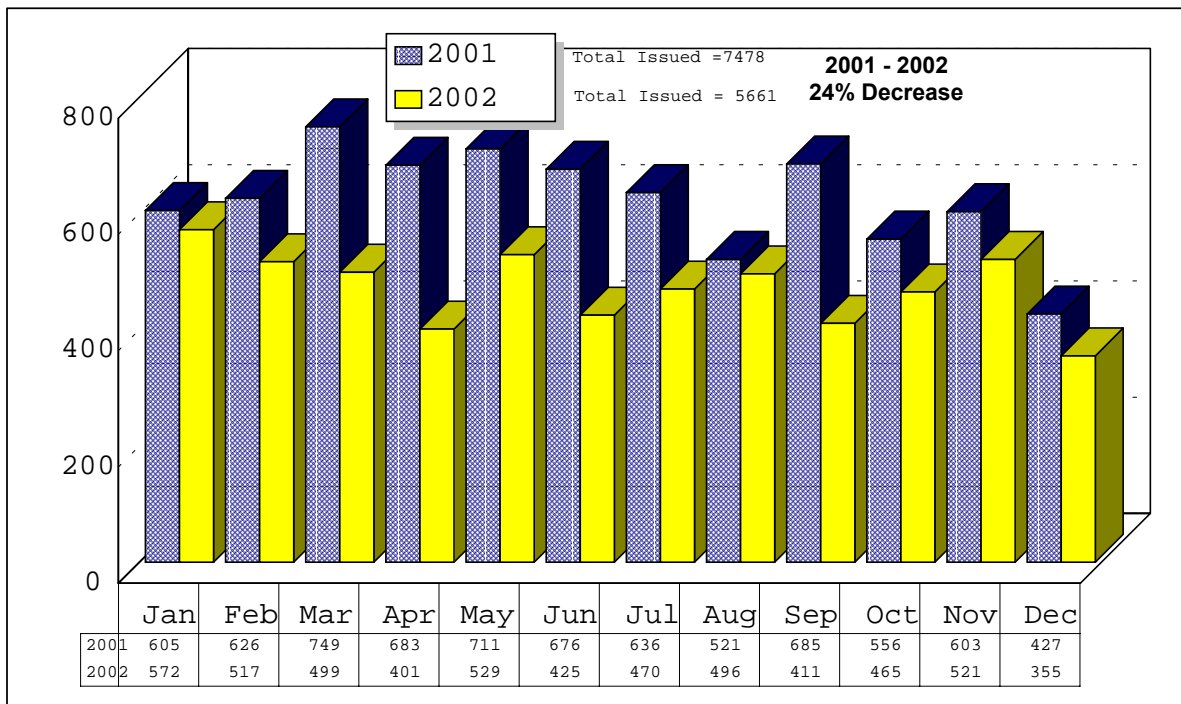
The placement of emphasis during 2003 on the Traffic Safety Unit’s goals and objectives is a double edged sword and this special cautionary note should be recalled at the end of 2003 when next year’s annual report is prepared. The cautionary note has specifically to do with the number of calls-for-service during 2003. Because vehicle stops for traffic violations are counted as a call-for-service, the Traffic Safety Unit’s emphasis on making an impact on traffic violations during 2003 will most assuredly have an impact on the total number of calls-for-service during 2003. Stated another way, 2002's reduction in calls-for-service over 2001 may actually be an artificial reduction in that category given the fact that the Traffic Safety Unit has been working at minimal staffing throughout 2002.

Total Citations Issued 2001 / 2002

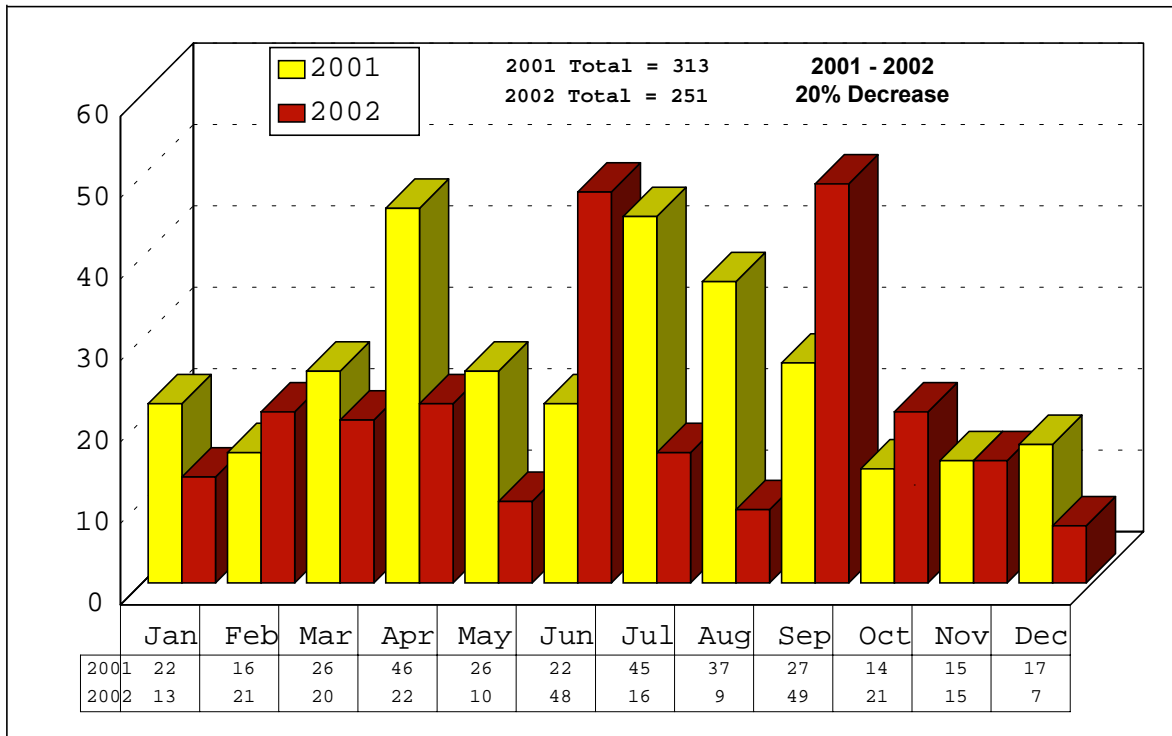

NON-TRAFFIC CITATIONS

Non-traffic citations is the official name in Pennsylvania for the issuance of a criminal summons for violation of a summary criminal offense, the lowest of all criminal offenses in the Commonwealth. More specifically, it is similar to a traffic ticket in that a police officer may stop an individual and issue a summons on a minor criminal offense, such as a quality of life violation, or mail the summons to the offender's residence at a later date.

During 2002, Tredyffrin Township Police Department issued 251 such criminal summons for minor quality of life violations, such as disorderly conduct and similar offenses. This represents a 17% increase in the issuance of summons since 2000.

ANIMAL CONTROL RESPONSES

The Animal Control function of the police department realized an 8% increase in overall calls-for- service during calendar year 2002 by handling 89 additional calls-for-service 1,220 during 2002 versus 1,131 during 2001. It should be additionally noted that there has been a 23% increase in the animal control function of the Police Department since 2000. The following is an analysis of those calls for service:

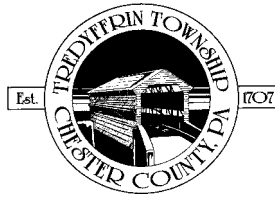
PERSONNEL ASSIGNMENTS

There are currently 60 individuals employed by Tredyffrin Township assigned to the police department. Of those, 51 are sworn personnel (police officers) and 9 are staff support (non-sworn personnel). With respect to the sworn personnel, 82% are assigned to the Patrol function to respond to 911 calls-for-service. Of the remaining 18%, 10% are assigned to the Criminal Investigative function and conduct follow-up investigations for those assigned to the Patrol function to allow them additional time to perform proactive patrols. The remaining 8% are the administration staff in the police department, including the Superintendent, Captain and two Lieutenants, all of whom will from time to time respond to answer 911 calls-for-service to provide assistance to those assigned to the Patrol function.

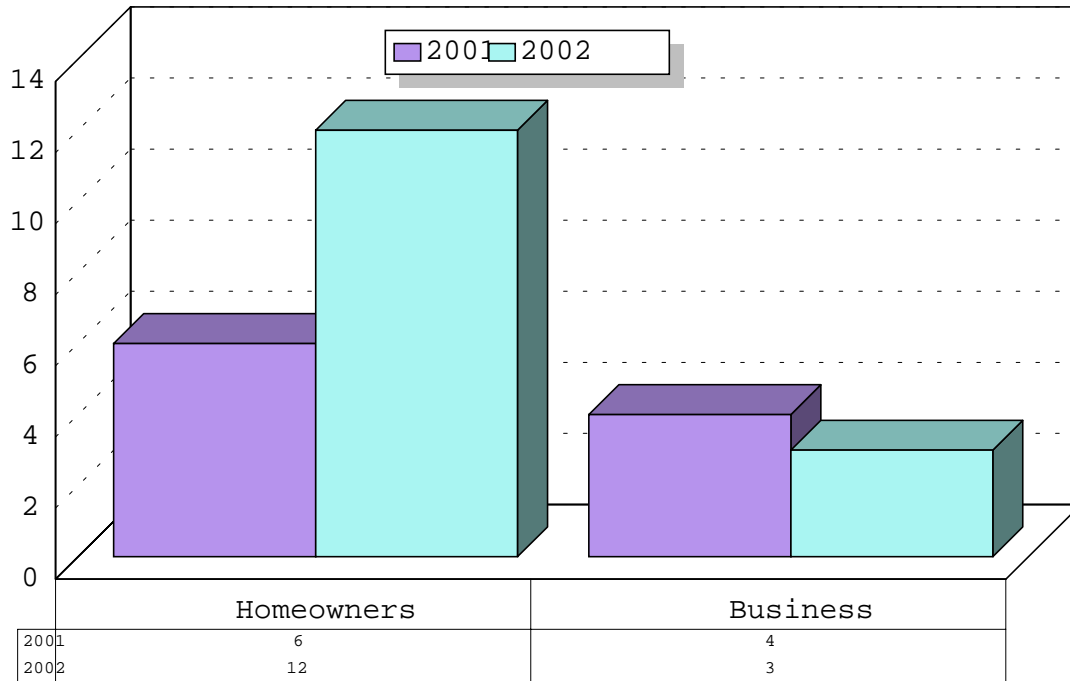
